Share out the roles in traditional churches:


- Clerk

Practical things that can be considered

These depend on the skills and interests of the individuals within your community but need to complement the support that is available though professional support and other community groups.

People's privacy needs to be respected.

Are you able to contemplate your death and the death of those closest to you? Accepting the fact of death, we are freed to live more fully. In bereavement, give yourself time to grieve. When others mourn, let your love embrace them.

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Practical, emotional, Spiritual…

It needs to respect and honor the person concerned – what do they want? Could include:

- WhatsApp group for person to reach out for help
- Regular contact popping in or phone calls or both
- What specific needs does the situation need?
- Support at appointments
- Support going through processes
- Financial support

Practical things that Mount Eden Has done

- Create a rota of people to sit with a dying Friend who did not wish to die alone and did not have family
- Hold a Meeting for Worship in the home of someone at the end of their life
- Have annual ways of remembering those who have died
- Offer a memorial meeting for Friends who have a bereavement
- The community comes together for funerals and memorials
- Testimony to the Grace of God in someone's life
- Memory boxes
